I want to thank everyone for making 2017 a resounding success for Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing! I'm humbled for the opportunity to have led our talented staff and dedicated volunteers as we expanded our service to a growing number of disabled active duty and disabled veteran participants in our fly fishing programs throughout the country. Throughout 2017, we made solid progress in several areas:

• Over 8,400 disabled active duty and disabled veteran participants served through local programs. Over 3,500 PHWFF volunteers contributed over 269,494 hours to lead and manage each program locally though partnerships with local fly fishing organizations, the Department of Veterans Affairs, Department of Defense military installations, and other

veteran-focused organizations.

- PHWFF includes 24 geographic regions nationwide and 216 local programs.
- PHWFF joined the Veterans Affairs Voluntary Services (VAVS) National Advisory Council as a Strategic Engagement Member. This membership included a Memorandum of Agreement with VAVS to increase our VA registered volunteers and our commitment to increase programs at VA facilities nationwide.
- Improved program management through a web-based registration and reporting system. Our Salesforce Contact Relationship Management (CRM) System will bring improved program management and reporting to our organization.

The emphasis for 2018 is to continue to provide our program services to an ever-increasing number of eligible participants. We will continue to provide consistent program delivery by developing and implementing a National Training Program for our growing volunteer force; develop and deliver a National Casting Program and Competition; and expand our National Destinations Program.

Thanks to everyone's collective efforts, PHWFF continues to serve our nation's disabled veterans as a premier nonprofit organization. Thank you for your dedication to our cause!

Collectively we travel on a path that guarantees a future of participant growth, financial stability, compliance, and a commitment to our mission. Our partnerships form an important pillar in our efforts as we mentor our participants through their own transitions in life.

Our Founder, Ed Nicholson provided a vision for PHWFF over 12 years ago. He set an important example for us all to help "heal those who served" our great nation. We shall never forget those that sacrificed for our freedoms. Together we will give them hope and help them heal.



Statement of Financial Position

PHWFF's support from our generous donors has increased year after year. In 2017, our revenue increased 14% over the previous year and 8% over our projected budget. PHWFF continued to maintain low overhead costs resulting in 85% of revenue spent on program expenses. PHWFF received nearly \$1.3 million in donated materials, services and travel related expenses which allowed us to stretch our monetary donations further to help even more disabled veterans and disabled military service personnel. Over the next few years, PHWFF plans to invest in a rigorous training curriculum to enhance our volunteers' skills and introduce new tools to assist them when working with our participants.

As an organization that has programs nationwide, PHWFF's success is mainly due to our great group of volunteers who run over 200 programs. Whether they are handing out pamphlets at fly fishing shows, helping in the classroom with fly tying or rod building, or setting up tables at fundraising events, our dedicated volunteers help support our participants and programs in numerous ways. In 2017, PHWFF volunteers contributed 269,494 hours which, using IRS guidelines, equates to a contribution of \$6,505,585 in a non-cash value to our organization.







The annual National Fly Tying Competition featured over 50 entries from PHWFF Participants. This competition showcases veteran participations' fly tying skills and creativity garnered from program classes and independent study in a casual, fun contest. This annual program has grown each year since its inception in 2012. The remarkable patterns and flies submitted from our participants across the country is most impressive. The five finalists from the PHWFF competition attended the International Fly Tying Symposium. While attending the two-day symposium the finalists demonstrated their fly tying skills at the PHWFF

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booth and met and learned from fly tying professionals from all over the country.



Fly Rod Building

Over 742 participants took part in the annual National Rod Building Program & Competition representing 22 PHWFF Regions and 98 PHWFF Programs. This annual competition affords our participants the experience of building their own fly rods as part of their physical and mental rehabilitation. It is a way for them to further exhibit the skills and creativity developed from program classes, meetings, and independent study. The rod building program gives participants the chance to be recognized for their newly developed rod building skills at the national level. Winning participants have the opportunity to improve their

rod building skills by attending a bamboo rod building school or attend a PHWFF National fly fishing trip.



Outings

In 2017, 168 participants went on 32 "trips of a lifetime" through the National Outings Program. Destinations included world class fishing locations in Montana, Michigan, Alaska, Maine, Florida, Colorado, North Carolina, Virginia, Tennessee and even international locations in Canada. PHWFF Participants that attend National Trips must first be active participants in their local PHWFF Program where they learn the basics of fly fishing and fly tying. As a result, PHWFF Participants have the opportunity to apply their fly fishing skills during outings which invariably supports their healing journey and creates a life time of memories.

Fundraising Summary and Overview ~ 2017

In 2017 PHWFF Programs realized continued success in fundraising efforts throughout the country. A variety of creative and standard approaches were employed to raise funds to support local program activities. Through the tireless efforts of volunteers, fundraising goals were met and often exceeded. Supporters external to the organization continued to contribute through third party fundraising efforts affirming that the cause is honorable, recognizable and endorsed.

Several national longstanding fundraising efforts were again successful, notably the 2-Fly Tournament, Mossy Creek Invitational, Battle at Boxwood, Smoky Mountain Grand Slam Challenge and Healing on the Fly New York City. With New York as the model, a second Healing on the Fly event was added in Boston. Our goal for all events is to keep costs low through volunteer and community support in order to direct the largest amount of each dollar raised to programs.

In its second year, Healing Saturday is a one-day nationwide PHWFF fundraising event at the program level. While the effort is focused on fundraising to support local programs, it also promotes community awareness and recruitment of volunteers and participants. Many programs partnered with local fly shops and set up tables to engage customers with materials, fly tying demos and displays of fly rods built by program participants. Over forty Healing Saturday events were held across the country.

To capitalize on the continued rapid growth of PHWFF's media footprint, a concerted effort was made to build local program presence on social media. Local programs received training to use PHWFF social media platforms, such as Facebook - generating greater awareness of our cause to serve disabled active military personnel and disabled veterans.


